I hope that everyone had a great Easter break and took some time to enjoy what feels like the last of the golden weather. There are a few important items to bring your attention to in the last weeks of this term or looking to the start of Term 2.

# Crazy hair day - last day of term

We have a number of our community, staff and students who are being treated for cancer. This can be a challenging time for all involved and we are incredibly appreciative of the support that many organisations provide those battling cancer. We discussed this with our student leaders, and they want to find a way to help raise awareness and offer financial support to these organisations. On Friday 12<sup>th</sup> April we will run a crazy hair day. Students are encouraged to come to school with wigs, funky hair and a gold coin donation. During breaks, there will be stalls run by students offering hair colouring (temporary) and other options for a small charge so please send cash in with your child. ### School production

We are really excited to put on *For Today*, a musical based on great kiwi music. It is a feel-good family friendly musical, set in a contemporary New Zealand high school. The show includes romance, action, drama, rugby, singing and dancing all set to a collection of classic songs by some of New Zealand's greatest singers and bands. # **Cell phone update**

As mentioned in my last letter home, at the start of Term 2 our cell phone policy will become schoolwide for the whole school day, as legislated by the government. We went through a thorough consultation period and responded to community feedback when we established our cell phone policy to protect the learning in the classroom several years ago. I have attached the updated procedure for managing cell phone use on site, ensuring we support the Government regulations that require schools to ensure students do not use or access a phone while they are attending school, including during lunch time and breaks. This will assist us with our preparation for the start of Term 2 and meeting the government requirement that we have the phones 'away for the day'.

### Uniform policy update

As part of our uniform review, we worked with the school Board to revisit our uniform policy. I have attached the new uniform policy which will apply from the start of Term 2. We have made adjustments based on feedback from the community and students. We will go through the detail of these changes with students, but for now a couple of key aspects are:

 No tattoos unless prior approval from SLT. The primary reason for this decision is based on ageappropriate nature of the decision. The Tattoo Artists Association of New Zealand (TAANZ) work to a code of ethics which means that they won't tattoo anyone under the age of 18 without the permission of a parent or guardian. We recognise that there can be significance to the decision to get a tattoo and are willing to discuss these reasons with families prior to

- getting a tattoo. Any student who currently has a tattoo needs to keep this covered at all times.
- Trial of discreet nose studs. One area that has grown significantly over the past 6 months is the wearing of facial piercings, in particular nose rings. Although it is not permitted in our uniform policy, this has been very difficult for us to police as there are limited stocks of clear studs available for replacement. In response to student and parent requests we will trial discreet nose studs only (no rings or other facial piercings). We have concerns that students will take advantage of this trial and wear more facial piercings. If students only wear discreet nose studs, then we will discuss the subsequent amendment of the uniform policy with our school board.

This is also a good time to remind you that we move onto our winter uniform in Term 2. There is a store here in town (just opposite the library) if you need to pick up some items or try anything on. For more details see our <u>uniform page</u> on the website.

I want to encourage you to have a look at <u>SchoolTV</u> over the next few weeks. It is full of excellent resources that can help with parenting and navigating some of our most challenging times raising a teenager.

We have committed to this and other offerings for our community as we can see the benefits in being informed with practical tools and research-based advice. We get feedback across the year from parents that additional resource and training opportunities would really help with the challenges of parenting.
